Dig Season 2021: The Summer of the Allosaurus







What a summer! We were so excited for the return of our popular Dinosaur Dig Program for 2021. Masks and boxed lunches made things a little different this year, but we kept everyone COVID-safe and unearthed some amazing fossils. This felt like the summer of Allosaurus! While we always find lots of Apatosaurus bones, this year we were up to our knees in fossils of the meat-eater Allosaurus at both of our quarries, including tail bones, back bones, parts of a skull, and of course lots of teeth. Despite the record heat this year, we hosted 247 people at our quarries and lab this summer (with another 180+ on our waitlists) provided learning opportunities to teachers, celebrated two birthdays, and excavated over a hundred new fossils. Our dig season was made possible thanks to all the help from our volunteers, field crew, museum staff, and students from Colorado Mesa University. We are thrilled to have such huge support for our signature program. We cannot wait to get back out there again in 2022.

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457 Colorado Ave.

What is now known as 457 Colorado Avenue, was originally divided into three lots. Documentation starting in 1890 reveals that these three lots hosted a multitude of buildings. The corner lot on 5th and Colorado, the current home of a food truck and the patio of Ramblebine Brewing Company, hosted the most well known of these, being the city's first Fire Department. The Fire Department shared the building with City Hall and neighbored the city jail for a number of years. The other two lots also housed their share of businesses. In many early photos, McCary Blacksmith and Mitchell Wagons (a wagon repository) are often depicted. Later on, in the late 1910's, all three of these lots would be replaced by an agricultural store.

Now, all three lots are home to the Ramblebine Brew Company. They started the renovation of their building in 2020 and are currently quite the popular destination for Grand Junction locals and tourists alike.

Seeking Fall/Winter Intern for Museum of the West!



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
The History of the Handy Chapel

The Handy Chapel has been the center of Black History in Western Colorado since its construction in the late 1890s. It remains one of the longest standing buildings in the town, and also continues on as a place of worship and community center for Black citizens of Grand Junction.
